Missionary. Evangelist. Preacher. Teacher. Blue Collar Prophet. Tom Stamman works daily to save the lost, preach the Word of God, and strengthen, encourage, instruct, comfort and edify the Body of Christ. If you've been to his meetings, you know he doesn't stop until he has personally prayed for every single person there.

Tom gave his life to Christ when he was seventeen years old at a Bible camp in Missouri. Later that same year, he went on a mission's trip to Colombia. It changed his life forever.

Tom graduated from North Central Bible College with a B.S. in Pastoral Studies in 1984. He has published eight books one of which was used as a textbook at Rhema Bible College in Tulsa, OK.

In 2004, Tom married the love of his life, Dr. Teresa Stamman and Impact Ministries International was conceived. The City of Refuge was born in 2008 when Tom realized that eight children from one of their Honduran feeding programs were naked and homeless. It wrecked him. He set his face like flint and has been on a relentless mission to save and improve the lives of widows and orphans in Honduras and dozens of countries around the world ever since.

Tom speaks and preaches at least 400 times a year to promote the message of James 1:27 and the IMI vision of fulfilling the great commission one life at a time.

Meet Your NLF Family: Jerry & Julie Neidlinger

We are Jerry and Julie Neidlinger from Crary. Jerry happily farms, while I am a stay-at-home mum homeschooling our children. Jerry and I first met through a Christian pen-pal website in 1999 while I was living and working in Australia. I am an Australian citizen by birth. I have two children from my marriage to my late husband. Amanda is 37 and Christopher is 35. Both Amanda and Chris reside in Australia.

After communicating for a period of time, Jerry flew across in November of 1999 to meet in person myself, my two children, and my extended family. It was a whirlwind two weeks. The following year we decided the Lord was leading us to further our relationship and in October of 2000, I flew to Nebraska where Jerry and I were married by his friend, Pastor Jim Bates.

After spending a month in the USA, Amanda, Chris and I flew back to Australia where I had work commitments. We applied for a visa for Jerry to join us in Australia. I did make a quick trip back to the USA during the months of March/April of 2001. I needed to keep my job as part of the visa application for Jerry. It was during this time we had contact with a young lady from Georgia who chose us to adopt her unborn son. I let Jerry know to not quit his job as an electrical engineer in Nebraska. I was coming back over to the USA. My manager said he would hold my job for me for twelve months even though he was not obligated to. I was working as a colour consultant and senior administration officer/personal assistant to the manager of a building company. It was truly a God thing!

September 2001...Jerry is supposed to fly out to Australia and we would fly back to the USA together. I will never forget that morning as I was getting ready for work and breaking news came on the TV...9/11...all flights were cancelled and we weren't sure what was going to happen. We had an extremely limited amount of time to get back to the USA and complete a home-study for the adoption. The Lord walked with us every step of the way opening doors that we weren't sure would get opened in time. But, all was finalized within eight weeks. Mission impossible made possible by the Lord. We had the honour of naming our son to be...Jackson O'Brien Neidlinger. It was a very exciting time. When we received the call to say Jackson was on his way into the world, we drove almost non stop to the state of Georgia, and our home-study was being completed and faxed to Georgia at the same time. Due to Georgia law, we had to wait ten days for the cooling off period. I was not about to let someone else care for my baby. I found the courage and asked if we could stay with the family who Jackson would be placed with for ten days. They said, "Yes!" They were a Christian family and we had a Christian attorney. We're forever thankful as we even attended church with this family and our attorney.

Back home in Nebraska, Jackson was then six months old when I made a call about another baby boy who was three weeks old in Mississippi. In a call back, we were asked, "When can you get here? This baby needs a home!" I took Jackson for his six month immunization shots, Jerry packed the car, and when I arrived back from the doctor, we drove through to Mississippi. That was a Friday evening, and we were placed with Jesse Owen Neidlinger on that Saturday morning. A medical examination was done on Monday, we were in court before the judge to finalize his adoption on Wednesday and were back home in Nebraska on Friday! I still remember driving to the state line knowing that if the Interstate Compact Study wasn't finished we couldn't cross that state line with Jesse. Only God could organize like that.

We hadn't finalized Jackson's adoption at that time. If you know anything about Jerry, you will know he is a "cross every 't' and dot every 'i'" kind of person. None of that happened during that time. Yes, it was the hand of God alone accomplishing His purposes for each of us.

We returned to Australia in September of 2002. When the boys turned seven, we packed our bags and returned once again to the USA where we became licensed foster parents. Over the years we have had approximately forty children in our care and, today, through foster care, we are the forever parents of Alana, Lanaysha and Aliyah. We are also guardians of our nieces, Jennifer, Angeline, Rebecca and nephew, Brandon (Brandon has since passed on). This is our last year of fostering as we seek what the Lord has planned for us. In the mix, we have been blessed with three grandchildren, Lily, Isabel and Ayva.

We have been blessed in so many ways including by the fruit of the womb of the womb of others. **Our Quiver Is Full.**



At the funeral, people were walking by the young man's casket and they saw the suit he was wearing and the fork placed in his right hand. Over and over, the pastor heard the question, "What's with the fork?" And over and over he smiled.

During his message, the pastor told the people of the conversation he had with the young man. He told them about the fork and what it symbolized to him. He told them how he could not stop thinking about the fork and told them that they probably would not be able to stop thinking about it either.

He was right. So, the next time you reach down for your fork, let it remind you, ever so gently, that the best is yet to come.
